Dean's message

TMU Libraries is proud to present its inaugural Impact Report. This report comes at a fitting time as we have spent the past year both reflecting on our history and looking toward the future. This has been a landmark year, marked by significant achievements, as we opened the new Bikram S. Dhillon & Family Medical Library in Brampton, launched Omni, a new academic search tool which expanded our access by over 25 million print books across Ontario, and celebrated the acquisition of significant special collections, such as the Jeremy Podeswa collection.

The stories in this report demonstrate the Library's role as the university's "engine of inquiry," a key metaphor in our new Strategic Plan. They highlight our active involvement in the academic life of our community and show how we continue to evolve our mission. As we move forward, I want to express my gratitude for your ongoing support and interest.





Campus campaign invites TMU community to discover the Library between the books

TMU Libraries and the university marketing team joined forces to create a campus-wide campaign that challenged traditional Library tropes and invited the community to discover the Library between the books.

The TMU Library building, at the corner of Victoria and Gould has lacked a visible presence despite being situated at the heart of campus. This year, the Libraries' communications team collaborated with university marketing to broaden awareness of the Library building's location and celebrate the Library's role as a catalyst for exploration, inquiry and discovery.

Discover the Library between the books was the tagline of an eye-catching campaign that showcased the depth of library resources, services, programs and opportunities. The campaign was designed to broaden ideas of the "Library", a word that, for many, conjures images of books, and book-related research material.

The project's goal was to reshape the public's perception of libraries by pointing beyond the books highlighting the incredible breadth of resources offered by TMU Libraries. It also aimed to build on the idea of the Library as an information hub and a catalyst for research and knowledge mobilization.

For the campaign, three large format posters were installed on an exterior wall of the Library building. The images also appeared on digital screens throughout campus, and ran on social media channels. Each campaign piece communicated the richness of the Library as a creative ecosystem and its role in making discovery and knowledge creation possible for the whole TMU community.





Celebrating 50 years of the Library building


In 2024, we celebrated the <u>50th anniversary of the Library building</u>—a milestone and opportunity to reflect back and look ahead to the next fifty years.


In 1974, the Library building opened at the corner of Gould and Victoria, becoming a new landmark for the University. The building's brutalist architecture, embracing ideals of simplicity and functionalism, has complemented and continues to complement the library's egalitarian function as a place for accessible information. At the same time, it embodies the modern ideas and innovative thinking that are hallmarks of both the university and the library.

In our year of celebration, TMU Library presented opportunities for the community to engage and explore the history of the building and Library. These opportunities were developed in-house and highlighted the current technologies and resources available to TMU students, staff and faculty.

The Archives and Special Collections team designed and developed a website using geospatial software, ArcGIS StoryMaps. The site tells the story of the Library building, and the innovative resources, services, and programs that have been introduced and offered throughout the decades.


The website was then translated into a time travel runway application, created by the Libraries' Immersive Technology Specialist, Michael Carter-Arlt. The runway allows users to visually move back and forth throughout the decades and explore important milestones.





A digital collage was also developed by Michael Carter-Arlt, and Immersive Technology Assistant, Ava Mozaffari, with archival images provided by the Archives and Special Collections, and current images by Library Communications. Carter-Arlt and Mozaffari repurposed and reformatted code from an earlier Library community project to create the collage.

In addition to the timelines and collage, the Library worked in collaboration with the Department of Architectural Science to construct four pillars that were on display at the Main Library. The pillars were approximately six feet in height, and each designed to invite the community to engage with different aspects, ideas, and environments within the Library. One displayed digitized histories of TMU Libraries and Library building. Another showcased unique items found in the Library. The third engaged the community with a magnetic board and cards, inviting them to reflect on the Library as a crossroad, a sanctuary, a sandbox, a coral reef, or the heart of campus. The final pillar was an interactive display, allowing patrons to highlight the types of library spaces that resonate most with them. When placed all together, the pillars formed a replica of the TMU Library building.













The celebrations concluded with a fun-filled reception where alumni, past employees, faculty, and current staff gathered for remarks, reflections, food, and lively conversation. Provost and Vice-President, Academic Roberta lannacito-Provenzano and University of Ottawa Professor and Alumna Constance Crompton both spoke about TMU Library's role as a central hub for knowledge creation and dissemination on campus.

Remarks finished with a recorded video by architect and alumnus Gordon Gill. He reflected on the Library as a "catalyst of knowledge sharing, and a critical asset as a reservoir of intellectual capital." Gill specifically noted that the building, because of its location on campus, could be redeveloped to become an example of sustainable design for both the university and the city.



Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library welcomes first cohort of medical students

The Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library opened its door to the School of Medicine's first cohort in September, becoming the second branch of TMU Libraries

In early July, TMU announced that Bikram Dhillon, CEO of BVD Group, and his family had made a transformational gift to the School of Medicine (SoM). With this generous donation, the Medical Library was named the Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library. While post-graduate students were welcomed to the School of Medicine over the summer, the Library opened its doors to its first cohort of undergraduate medical students in September, joining the Law Library as the second branch of TMU Libraries—now a multi-campus, integrated library system. Located within the Medical School Building in Brampton, the Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library is situated at the heart of the SoM, providing a gateway for study, learning, research and collaboration.

Melissa Helwig joined TMU Libraries as head of the Medical Library in 2024. In the year leading up to the physical opening, she built a medical library team, fielded research and curriculum questions, conducted teaching sessions for clinical faculty, and acquired collections and resources.

Helwig has been forging strong connections with the SoM team including clinical faculty. She has also been working with Dr. Pamela Liao, Disability Health lead in the SoM Community, Culture, & Belonging Office and special advisor to the dean, to develop the Accessibility and Disability Inclusion in Medicine Library Guide designed to grow resources in this area. The Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library is opening in two phases. The first floor, now open, offers students and faculty access to learning, study and teaching spaces, as well as, collections, research support and information services. The Library's teaching and learning spaces also include a circular classroom, which incorporates Indigenous design principles.

In the next phase, the second floor will offer additional study areas, a makerspace with access to a podcasting studio, 3D printers, as well as other technology that assist medical research, non-clinical practices and experiential learning opportunities.

As the new library team settles into its Brampton location, Helwig continues to manage services and library supports, while also conducting outreach to engage clinical faculty, medical learners and the community.

The Bikram S. Dhillon and Family Medical Library collection continues to expand, complemented by indepth medical research guides. Medical students also have access to all TMU Libraries' collections including areas focused on urban health, community services, disability studies, and other specialized resources.

The team is now working with the SoM to ensure course readings are available, and students and faculty can locate required academic resources. They will also be incorporating additional teaching sessions, and research and curriculum support as the school grows.









TMU Libraries adopts new search and discovery tool, Omni

This year, TMU Libraries became the nineteenth academic library in Ontario to adopt Omni—an academic search tool designed to bring library search and service functions together to provide a seamless, one-stop search experience for users.

Moving to Omni has opened up access to over 25 million items to the TMU community, allowing users to search and access print items in the catalogues of eighteen additional academic libraries across the province.



Omni is an academic search tool developed through the Ontario Council of University Libraries (OCUL). The tool fosters collaboration across Ontario academic libraries and enhances discovery and delivery of information resources at TMU Libraries and at Omni partner institutions.

"I am thrilled that TMU has implemented Omni. Not only has this improved the experience of discovery for TMU students and researchers, but being part of the Omni network means that we are integrated into an Ontario wide research collection," says Mark Robertson, dean of Libraries. "This radically expands our community's access to over 25 million items."

The transition to Omni means that users can borrow from, and return, to any partner library in Ontario eliminating the need to request interlibrary loans from those institutions. There are also longer loan periods and unlimited renewals on print items.

Omni is also now home to student, faculty, researchers and staff library accounts.





Film and Television Director Jeremy Podeswa donates a rich collection of archival material to TMU Libraries

TMU Libraries' Archives and Special Collections is now home to a very rich and in-depth collection of television director Jeremy Podeswa's (Image Arts, '84) archival materials.

Director Jeremy Podeswa has gifted an archive of materials from his career, including: scripts, storyboards, photos, concept art pieces, architectural drawings, site plans, set drawing, as well as handwritten and typed notes from shows like Six Feet Under, True Blood, Queer as Folk, Carnivàle, Boardwalk Empire and Game of Thrones.

The donation includes a wealth of varied materials across genres from drama to horror and science fiction to fantasy, providing students with access to the insights involved in the creative process from beginning to end, from script to screen

It is Podeswa's hope that the archival materials will act as a kind of roadmap for young filmmakers wanting to learn about the process. "There are papers in these archives that show all the steps that lead from script through to production—how a script is broken down and prepped, and all of the other work that a director does at every stage leading to the final cut," said Jeremy Podeswa. "Also evident here is the progression from my first and second feature films, to Queer as Folk to Six Feet Under and onward. You can see the trajectory in the materials, and I hope that can be inspiring and instructive to young filmmakers who may want to shape a similar path."

Given the breadth of his career, and as evident with this collection, it is safe to say Podeswa has helped shape the phenomenon known as prestige television. "We are deeply grateful for Jeremy Podeswa's donation of archival materials. It is so meaningful to have original work of such an illustrious alumnus represented in our Archives and Special Collections," said Mark Robertson, dean of Libraries. "This collection will be invaluable to students and researchers who want to explore and learn from Podeswa's creative processes. This donation also complements other strengths of our collections in media and the creative industries."

Once the cataloging of all materials is complete, items will be made available to students, researchers and the public by appointment at TMU's Archives and Special Collections.







Having previously worked in history museums and municipal archives, Hall, who aspires to one day be an archivist or collections manager, wanted to broaden her experience working with older materials. At the Libraries' Archives and Special Collections she's now learned "how library-based collections operate differently from other cultural/heritage institutions—especially in terms of descriptive standards, and the emphasis on serving academic as well as public audiences," she says.




TMU Libraries Strategic Plan
